9. PUBLIC APPEARANCE/COMMENTS

The City Clerk read a letter from an anonymous speaker voicing a concern that the proposed Local Roadway Safety Plan does not include bicycle safety nor does it mention separated and protected bike lanes.

The City Clerk read a letter from Patricia Vargas asking the Council to stop rezoning the City to appease developers and to stop the Hudson project. She would like to keep her country lifestyle and her current way of life.

The City Clerk read a letter from Historic Mira Loma asking that they reject the Hudson Project. The developer has multiple projects in the City and he has built a retaining wall that is now negatively impacting a resident by causing flooding to her home. At this time, the developer has ignored her pleas for help.

Pamela Blynn voiced a concern that there are not enough road improvements for the added housing developments that are being planned. Additionally, there are no public transportation services in the Sunnyslope area. She suggested that the Council consider additional traffic measures to control speeding on Sierra Avenue. She encouraged the Council to provide public comments so that citizens know what is going on in their city.

Renae Rock spoke in support of Vicki Goedert who is dealing with flooding issues as a result of the Hobbs development. She asked that the Council stop this project. She noted that the Mira Loma residents have voiced their desire to keep their animal keeping lifestyle. She encouraged the Council to take a drive over there and see it for themselves.

Roberto Ramirez asked the Council to stop the medium high density projects in the community as the people moving here will eventually complain about the equestrian and animal keeping lifestyle that current residents enjoy.

City Manager Rod Butler reported that this month marks the two-year anniversary of the partnership with the Jurupa Area Recreation and Park District to jointly operate the Eddie Dee Smith Senior Center. He noted that this successful partnership has allowed the City to increase the level of services that will involve future community services as well.

Mayor Chris Barajas opened the public hearing and called for any public comments.

The City Clerk read a letter from Masaki Mendoza asking that the Council revise the Zoning Code to allow higher density. This would provide more housing choices

which are more affordable and could allow future generations to live in Jurupa Valley.

Ezra Ausy stated that there will always be a homeless crisis but when cities keep zoning for homes and not for apartments or inclusionary housing, the homeless crisis cannot be solved. She suggested that the Council consider higher density homes which will also contribute to the local economy.

Tom Elder stated that residents do not want high density housing. He encouraged those who want to live in apartments or high density housing to move elsewhere.

Roberto Ramirez stated that he has lived in Jurupa Valley for 24 years and he does not appreciate the comments from the youth who want to change the community by advocating for high density housing.

Kady Dong stated that children are the future and they will make their own decisions about housing. She suggested that there are issues such as homelessness and low-income residents who cannot afford housing. She stated that there needs to be some sacrifices and compromises.

Rena Rock stated that there are sufficient numbers of apartments just west of the I-15 freeway. What most of the Mira Loma residents want is more equestrian and animal keeping properties. The homes being built now are not compatible with the community.

At the request of City staff, the public hearing was continued to the August 4, 2022 meeting.


Mayor Pro Tem Leslie Altamirano encouraged residents who have questions or concerns to contact the City Council through their email as the Council is always available to receive public input and are willing to set up a meeting to listen to their constituent’s concerns.
